Why Lent?

I was reared in what I would now identify as a traditional Southern Baptist church in Western Kentucky in the 1970s and '80s. I was taught well by loving women (at first) and men (when I got into the youth group) in Sunday School and offered every opportunity for growth available to children and youth in that era. I was conditioned in the Baptist way of faith to believe that the Bible is our guide and the congregation is the visible presence of Christ in the world and under the authority of the Living Christ in all things. Much of what I know about how to follow Jesus I learned in those days. I say that first to make clear that nothing that follows this paragraph is meant to imply that my training was anything less than complete within the specific context I was raised.

y home church is a fine example of the free church tradition that was true of most Baptist churches in my childhood. We knew very little about what was going on in more liturgical church circles. So, I did not grow up with Advent or Lent. I do remember discussion of Good Friday as the day of crucifixion but I do not recall attending a service on the day. I did not encounter Ash Wednesday or Maundy Thursday until I got to seminary and was not aware generally of Holy Week as a special time. Frankly, both Christmas and Easter occurred without much by way of build-up.

hen I arrived at the Candler School of Theology, an official seminary of the United Methodist Church, I was introduced to the rich liturgical traditions of the seasons of the church year. I enrolled at Candler in January. So, my first real encounter was with Lent. Now I had some awareness of Ash Wednesday from Catholic friends through the years; but I had an incomplete understanding of the idea that the 40-day period of Lent was an opportunity for reflection and preparation that often involved a partial fast of some sort or what people often refer to as giving up something for Lent.



I determined to engage these new traditions that year and found them helpful, which is the important word here. I did not find them better than my previous experience or in any way more spiritual; but I did find them helpful. Something in the disciplined rhythm of that first Lenten season opened me up to a fresh experience of the passion and resurrection of Christ. In the years that followed, I found that the repentance of Ash Wednesday, the commitment to following the command to love on Maundy Thursday and standing in the shadow of the cross on Good Friday all became equally helpful in inviting me into the story of Jesus in a powerful way each year.

So I engage in both the discipline and intentional worship of the Lenten season because they have become for me a helpful guide down the path of following Jesus through the cross and into new life. The practices are quite simple. Determine with God's help to forgo something in your life that will help you to focus on the presence of God in your life. Take time each day to meditate on Scripture and pray, maybe using the guidance of the Lenten Devotional Guide available from the church. Then make time for worship during Holy Week and engage with others in walking with Jesus. I invite find it helpful.



Celebrating Hank Ellington's Ministry to Calvary Baptist Church

Wednesday night chicken cordon bleu, the Calvary Christmas Project, and Hank Ellington–all classic Calvary Baptist Church institutions.

Ordained minister, Bible study teacher, youth worker, deacon, softball player, preacher, RA leader, writer, VBS Mission rotation leader, Calvary and CBF committee member are all roles that describe Hank's commitment to Calvary and to Baptists. Hank has spent the last three years profiling the lives of 150 Calvary members. Let's take a look at Hank and his life and work at Calvary.

In November of 1972, a young couple, Hank and Linda Ellington, like many of you, joined Calvary Baptist Church. Within the year, Hank and Linda were leading seventh and eighth graders in Discipleship Training on Sunday evenings. Thus began two decades of committed ministry leading the youth of Calvary in Sunday School and Discipleship in addition to writing and serving on faculty with many Kentucky Baptist and Southern Baptist groups.

By 1977, Hank was ordained a deacon and began serving the larger church with deacon responsibilities and work on several committees. In the summer of 1990, Hank's life was about to change dramatically when he was asked to serve as Interim Youth Minister. After finishing the interim in May 1992 Calvary's Minister of Education retired and Hank answered God's call to full-time ministry. Hank was ordained to the gospel ministry at Calvary in March of 1995 and received his master's degree from Lexington Theological Seminary in May.

In 1998, Hank's title changed to Associate Pastor and in January 2022 Hank moved to his final position as part-time Associate Pastor for Logos Ministries. Hank loves Calvary Baptist Church. Whenever Hank has been asked to serve he has given his time, talents and love to his Lord and the people of our congregation and community. We look forward to celebrating his considerable ministry and dedicated service on Hank Day in May.

Together in Unity

How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity! Psalm 133:1

The congregation of Calvary Baptist Church is a tapestry God is weaving together. The threads God is using are from many places and experiences, come from a variety of faith practices and backgrounds and hold a broad set of political opinions. Our tapestry finds its strength in the diversity of materials; but such an interweaving can be vulnerable to the divisive discourse in the world around us. My hope and prayer is that Calvary can continue to be a place where we can find our center in Jesus in such a way that we can dwell together in unity. In our planning for this year, the ministry staff has adopted the theme Together in Unity rooted in the song of the psalmist from Psalm 133.

During some congregational discernment conversations last year, we reached a consensus on three commitments we made to God and each other. The second of which was this: We commit to seeking unity in Christ out of our diversity. Here is a broad overview of what we will do in 2024 to focus on that commitment.

We will begin by asking the simple question... Who Is Jesus? The process of seeking unity in Christ begins with understanding exactly who is at the center of our communion and why. As we continue to develop our theme, we seek unity in Christ as we...Gather as the Church. In April and May we will ask another simple question: Why Church? Each service will feature testimony about the place of the church in the lives of our members. As we turn to the fall of the year, we will explore how our life together becomes a model for the world. Our fall worship series through October will be Life Together as we will explore what it means to live out our unifying community in the sight of the world.

I invite you to join me in praying that our communion here at Calvary will be a beacon of unity that is rooted in the love of Christ for all in the year to come. How sweet it will be.
